I know in the latest WFTDA announcement regarding the back on track initiative there was a mention of exploring flexibility.

I am curious if there has ever been some sort of push or discussion to shrink the track slightly with the intention of opening up venue options. I know many leagues including us lost their primary space and as we explore and find new spaces, many of them being roller or ice hockey venues I think having a track+ref lanes fitting within this preset domain would be wildly beneficial.

I feel like this would help a lot of leagues especially when it comes to WFTDI risk/coverage. I haven't done the math but I assume it would range from a 7 foot reduction max in width. For example a rink here is 58 feet wide instead of 65.

Hi everyone!

Yes - this is the case. Our working group is still around and we were planning on doing some testing before the pandemic, then had to wait for people to start up again. We do have the blessing of the BOD to do this work as we recognize that the size of our track makes it hard for leagues to find spaces and our Risk guidelines are not globally relevant (as hard as we try to make them so). Additionally, I do want to look at our games policies such as the requirement for rope and tape as those are resources that are hard to source sometimes and add expenses. I am really excited to start these conversations with you all!

Now that there is no sanctioning, it's a perfect time for leagues to test things out and report back to us. Without sanctioning, the Risk Management Guidelines are required for any league holding WFTDA Insurance and are strongly recommended for everyone else. This means that if you do not meet the track

requirements in that document and you have an insurance claim, your claim may be denied. Any league not holding WFTDA insurance should follow the requirements of their insurance and/or local safety requirements.

I shared this post with the rest of the team to let them know that people are interested in working on this with us. If you do any changes or testing, feel free to share it on this post or to ask us questions here. If there is another way to work together on this, we'll let you know what to do. I just need to talk to them about how best to organize things!

would be a super cool tool to use to compare the game between tracks too.)

And it's not up to us to approve variations to the track. As an org we are totally open to it. We just need to work with you all, the skaters and officials, to determine what kind of track is still "WFTDA derby". How much of a variance and what kind of variance works? There will be a big difference between a track with a different apex vs one with a shorter straightaway. Do we still need an offset?

We're open to trying things out and then having a conversation as a community on what works and what doesn't work.

I'm not opposed to anything being discussed here, but I do have a few hesitancies.

For indoor spaces, the basketball hoops (which are at regulation 10ft high) would have to be retracted or otherwise lifted to meet with RM Guidelines section 3.3 Infield, Skating and Competition Surfaces which states: "No structures, speakers, lights or other objects shall protrude overhead above the INFIELD

and SKATING SURFACE (Zones A, B, C, D and E) within 10 feet (3.05 meters) of the floor". Most indoor facilities will have that ability, so not as much a problem there but for outdoor spaces, I think it's safe to assume that the basketball hoops are attached permanently to the ground on non-adjustable poles, and those poles may not be outside of the runoffs, which also raises concerns about section 3.3 again: "Posts may be present in the INFIELD (Zone A) if padded. Padding should be dense foam and a minimum of 3 inches (7.62 centimeters) thick. Posts may not be present in zones B, and C.

Posts may be present in zone D only IF there is a barrier > 5 feet (1.524m) from the OUTER

TRACK LINE of zone C, and the post is located outside the barrier. Posts may be integrated

into the barrier if they do not present additional risk to participants.

A basketball court that has run-offs is 32m x 19m (104.987 ft x 62.336ft), and outdoor spaces may not have runoffs if the planners/builders wanted to save money and leave that space as grass or other non-skateable surfaces.

I'm basing this just on my locality, but most of the outdoor spaces here are not full sized courts with runoffs, and all of the indoor basketball facilities refuse to allow roller derby on their floors for fear of damages. I think this is 100% worth exploring and we could (and should) find a way to make derby more accessible, but it may involve changing the track size as well as gameplay to achieve (for example, reduce to 3 blockers per team for narrower track, eliminate drawbacks to allow for narrower safety lane, perhaps reduce to 2 OPRs because hey, less skaters less staffing). My league is in Wisconsin, so even if we could get approval from the city council for an outdoor event with this noise level and crowd size, we would still only have around 4 months of appropriate weather for outdoor events and/or practices. It could actually hurt us in the long run while we look for a new spaces, as renters would tell us to go play outside instead.

Again, I'm not necessarily opposed, just unsure of how many spaces would open up for leagues in my area/climate without a more impactful change to the track and/or gameplay.

I think the basketball court was a size idea more than anything else. In Europe we have a lot of multi-sport centres whose hall is usually about the size of a single basketball court. We can use them to train, but can't have sanctioned bouts, and scrimmage with a full ref crew isn't really an option either. Lots of us have tracks painted at various 90% plus sizes in these venues.

Bigger halls are rarer, more expensive and less likely to allow skating. For example, there are less than 5 sports venues in the UK which can fit a double track set up.
